Philosophy of Teaching Music

As a teacher of music, I strive to pass on my passion for music and to inspire learning. My experience with learning music has been a vital part of my personal development in life. The time I spent learning music has inspired me to teach others about the wonderful art of music making. As a trumpet instructor, I desire to share with students the rich history of the trumpet and its many famous musicians, both past and present, and motivate students to understand how to develop into strong musicians able to teach and perform. In my opinion, students learn best when they are presented materials in a way that best suits their preferred learning style. Therefore, I like to balance my teaching using various learning techniques that help each student to not only learn the repertoire but also to become motivated critical thinkers. In teaching music, I place a heavy emphasis on interactive learning where I demonstrate the music and encourage students to engage with me and their classmates thus promoting a balance of learning techniques that can inspire critical thinking from all students.
